Raiders and Invaders

Topic Overview

The Year 4 topic this term is Saxons and Vikings. This is a history based topic but other areas of the curriculum will also be covered, including Geography, Art, Design Technology, Science and Literacy.

We will be studying who the Anglo-Saxons were and how they influence our life today; and discover who the famous Anglo-Saxons were and why Alfred was so 'great'? In addition we will study why the Vikings came to Britain and how they made their journey. We will also compare the life of a Viking to now and explore how the Vikings lived.

In DT we will be designing and creating our own Viking helmets.

Long, sleek and fast longships were designed to travel up narrow rivers and held up to 120 men. On the prow (front of the ship) was the head of a fierce creature to frighten the spirits of the land that the Vikings were raiding. A longship at sea would be navigated by the position of the sun, moon, and stars in the sky. Vikings also used their knowledge of birds, fish and mammals to gauge their location, along with the tides, and weather conditions.

Get Creative and design and make your own Viking long boat. You could use cardboard, milk/juice cartons, straws, card - anything that works for your design. Use the following website for inspiration. http://blog.hobbycraft.co.uk/how-to-make-a-viking-longboat/

Try making Pea soup, a typical Viking period dish



Ingredients:

8 ounces of dried split peas

6 chicken bullion cubes or vegetable stock cubes garlic to taste

2 tablespoons of bacon fat or butter

Method:

Soak 8 ounces of dried split peas in water overnight. Rinse and drain. Place in a pot with 8 cups of water, 6 chicken bullion cubes, garlic to taste, and 2 tablespoons of bacon fat. Cook over medium heat until the peas are soft. They may be pressed through a strainer to make a puree or served as is.

Research some traditional designs using http://viking.wikidot.com/shield-colours for inspiration.








Imagine you are a Viking and write a diary about your journey on a longboat from Norway to Scotland.

Literacy Overview

This term we will do much of our literacy work from our class text, How to Train Your Dragon by Cressida Cowell. We will be writing responses to this text which will include diaries and letters in character as well as additional chapters. We will also be writing setting and character descriptions.

In our grammar sessions we will be using and recognising adjectives, nouns and adverbs; recognising simple sentences; using compound and complex sentences; using conjunctions to express time or cause; and learning how to use dialogue punctuation.



Maths Overview

Each week in the 'What we are doing in class' newsletter details of the objectives to be covered will be given. Key topics worked on this term are number, place value, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division; shape and measure including area, perimeter and symmetry. We will also be revising telling the time on a 24 hour clock, working with fractions and decimals to identify equivalents and adding and subtracting.
