Designated members of staff to be responsible for cleaning of surfaces, door handles, toilets etc throughout the day. In addition to the daily cleaning by the school cleaners, a cleaner will be employed to work during the school day to regularly clean surfaces, toilets, communal areas etc.
Younger children will have support if they struggle cleaning their hands independently. They will be taught how to practice these habits through modelling.
Where possible, all spaces will be well ventilated using natural ventilation (open windows and open doors). Premises Officer to open windows in morning before school. Parents to ensure that children come to school with suitable layers of clothing including a jumper, cardigan or hoodie.
Doors will be propped open, where it is safe to do so (bearing in mind fire safety and safeguarding), to limit use of door handles and aid ventilation.
School layout and Classes Classrooms to be kept as clear as possible with unnecessary items removed. Remove soft furnishings and soft toys.
Children to remain with their 'bubble' at all times, and will avoid contact with any other groups. Bubbles will be made up of full classes (with the exception of the two Reception classes that will be considered as one bubble due to the sharing of resources, staff and the outdoor learning area. Year <mark>4 no longer one bubble.</mark>
Children in Years 1 and 6 to have their own pack of everyday resources that they will need. They will sit at small group tables, with the added layer of protection of a clear plastic desk divider.
Shared resources within classrooms will be cleaned regularly. Resources will not be moved between bubbles unless they have been left untouched for a minimum period of three days.
Each bubble will have its own class teacher and member of support staff. The crossing of bubbles by staff will be minimised wherever possible. Staff that do have to cross bubbles will try wherever possible to keep their distance from pupils and other staff, but this will not be possible in the younger years.

	School timetable
	There will be staggered start and end of day times to minimise congestion in the playground, at the gate, and in the street. Times will be communicated in advance with parents.
	PE and Dance
	PE sessions will be outdoors. In the event of poor weather, the children may miss their PE session as we do not have sufficient indoor space. If PE lessons are carried out indoors, they will be limited to maximum of 15 pupils at a time and the hall will be well ventilated with the windows opened.
	 PE equipment used during sessions will either: be for that bubble's use only, or cleaned thoroughly between groups, or left for 48 hours between groups (or 72 hours for plastic items)
	If any external sports coaches are used, they will maintain a minimum 2m distance and carry out classes outdoors.
	Where closer adult support is needed, eg for younger classes, the teacher or TA from that bubble, will provide the support.
	Dance lessons (for Years 4 to 6) will be in groups of no more than 15 so that they can be appropriately distanced from each other and the dance teacher.
	The PE offer will be reviewed regularly.
	Music
	Our music provision will be modified. We will ensure that there is a distance between the children
	and the music teacher <mark>by carrying out music lessons in the hall instead of the music room</mark> .

Instruments will be cleaned between children. The choice of instruments will be restricted and there will be no large group singing indoors, but there may be sessions outdoors. Educational Visits No educational visits will take place in the Spring Term. Local outdoor fieldwork/walks may take place as normal.
Lunchtimes and Playtimes Each group will have play at their own time or in their own allocated part of the playground to avoid contact with other groups and classes. Each class will be supervised at play and lunchtime by the member of support staff who works in their class wherever possible. The playground will have dividers to ensure groups remain separate. Each bubble will have their own set of playtime equipment (balls, hoops etc) and these will be cleaned regularly.
Lunches to be eaten in classrooms for some classes, and in the dining hall at staggered times for other classes.
Hot dinners now available to all children. Some KS2 classes will have lunches in their classroom (either provided from home or hot meals in individual containers from the school meals provider) in order to minimise the flow of children in the dinner hall and catering service counter.
Breakfast and After School Club
Booking must be made in advance, <mark>and we will have a priority booking system that offers places to</mark> Key Workers first.
In Breakfast club, children will sit at tables across two interconnecting rooms with children from their bubble as far as is possible.
The After School Club will be spilt into three clubs: Nursery/Reception; Years 1 and 2; and Years 3, 4, 5 and 6. Children will spend as much of this time as possible outside, weather permitting, and will be encouraged if sitting at an activity indoors to sit with children within their bubble, as far as is possible. After School Club will only operate until 4:30pm until Easter, and then it will be reviewed by the SLT.
When inside, or in close contact outside, staff will be encouraged to wear visors in the breakfast and after school clubs due to working with children across a number of bubbles.

Spreading infection through sneezing etc	Children and adults are advised to cover their mouth and nose with a disposable tissue when they cough or sneeze and put the tissue in the bin. If no bin is available they should put the tissue into their pocket or up their sleeve for disposing of later. If you don't have any tissues available, they should cough and sneeze into the crook of their elbow. Children reminded to wash their hands after sneezing. Face coverings are not recommended to be worn for children under the age of 12.
	Staff have the option of wearing face masks when in communal areas and corridors/halls.
Child or staff member is unwell with symptoms of COVID-19	If anyone becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough, a high temperature, or loss of taste/smell they must be sent home and advised to follow the COVID-19 guidance for households with possible coronavirus infection guidance.
	If a child is awaiting collection, they should be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age of the child and with appropriate adult supervision if required. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people.
	If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom should be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else.
	PPE should be worn by staff caring for the child while they await collection if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs).
	In an emergency, we will call 999 if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk.
	If a member of staff has helped someone who was unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, they do not need to go home unless they develop symptoms themselves (and in which case, a test is available) or the child subsequently tests positive. They should wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after any contact with someone who is unwell. Cleaning the affected area with normal household disinfectant after someone with symptoms has left will reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people.

		The Headteacher will decide whether the group of children and staff need to be sent home to isolate where a test has not been sought.
	A case of COVID-19 is confirmed at our setting	When a child, young person or staff member develops symptoms compatible with coronavirus, they should be sent home and advised to self-isolate for 10 days. Their fellow household members should self-isolate for 10 days. All staff and students who are attending our school will have access to a test if they display symptoms of coronavirus, and are encouraged to get tested in this scenario. Where the child, young person or staff member tests negative, they can return to school and the fellow household members can end their self-isolation. Where the child, young person or staff member tests positive, the rest of their bubble should be sent home and advised to self-isolate for 10 days. The other household members of that wider
		class or group do not need to self-isolate unless the child, young person or staff member they live with in that group subsequently develops symptoms. Where a test has been taken and the child is waiting for results, the Headeacher will make an informed decision about whether to suspend the group provision until confirmation.
		As part of the national test and trace programme, if other cases are detected within the cohort or in the wider setting, Public Health England's local health protection teams will conduct a rapid investigation and will advise us on the most appropriate action to take. In some cases a larger number of other children may be asked to self-isolate at home as a precautionary measure – perhaps the whole class, site or year group. Where settings are observing guidance on infection prevention and control, which will reduce risk of transmission, closure of the whole setting will not generally be necessary.
