Ventilation

Where possible, all spaces will be well ventilated using natural ventilation (open windows and open doors). Premises Officer to open windows in morning before school. Parents to ensure that children come to school with suitable layers of clothing including a jumper, cardigan or hoodie.

Doors will be propped open, where it is safe to do so (bearing in mind fire safety and safeguarding), to limit use of door handles and aid ventilation.

Carbon dioxide monitors in teaching and office spaces to regularly monitor levels. Action to be taken if levels exceed recommended levels.

School layout and Classes

Classrooms to be kept as clear and tidy as possible with unnecessary items removed. This will assist with the cleaning process.

Shared resources will be cleaned regularly. Resources that are moved between classes should be cleaned before being returned to the resource room unless they have been left untouched for a minimum period of three days.

The laptops and tablets will be wiped with antibacterial wipes between different groups of children.

One way system in place on staircases.

Children to remain in their class bubble when inside the building as much as possible, including when eating their lunch, walking down the stairs etc. Assemblies will be in smaller groups so that classes can sit at distance from each other.

School timetable

There will continue to be slightly staggered start and end of day times to minimise congestion in the playground, at the gate, and in the street. Times will be communicated in advance with parents. Parents and Carers will not be allowed into the playground before school (apart from Early Years). In the afternoon, EYFS and KS1 parents and carers will come into playground to collect

their children at 3:20pm, and KS2 at 3:30pm. This will be reviewed regularly and further measures may be needed.

PE and Dance

PE sessions will be outdoors, where possible. In the event of poor weather, the children may miss their PE session as we do not have sufficient indoor space. If PE lessons are carried out indoors, the hall will be well ventilated with the windows opened. Children will wash their hands before and after PE sessions.

Dance lessons (for Years 4 to 6) will be in whole class groups in a well-ventilated hall.

The PE offer will be reviewed regularly.

After School sports clubs will not take place until after the February half term at the earliest.

Music and Assemblies

The rooms will be well-ventilated. Instruments will be cleaned between children.

Class Assemblies will take place in the top hall in two performances so that there is sufficient space, and the hall will be well-ventilated. Parents and Carers will not be able to watch the assemblies live for the first half term, then this will be reviewed.

Educational Visits

Local outdoor fieldwork/walks may take place as normal.

Trips further afield can take place, following a detailed risk assessment and agreement by the headteacher. Parents will be informed and written consent will be obtained for each child.

	Lunchtimes and Playtimes Classes will be mixing at playtimes and lunchtimes when outdoors only as the risk of covid transmission is greatly reduced when outside (see updated playground rota). As before the pandemic, they will be at staggered times to reduce the number of children using the playground at any one time. This is especially important at the moment due to the reduced space caused by the playground development work. The playground is the only place where bubbles should be mixing; it is important that all measures inside the building are strictly adhered to. Lunches will be at a staggered time also (see lunchtime schedule). Breakfast and After School Club Booking must be made in advance. In Breakfast club, children will sit at tables across two interconnecting rooms to ensure there is sufficient space and ventilation.
	The After School Club will be spilt into two clubs: Nursery, Reception and Year 1; and Years 2 to 6. Children will spend as much of this time as possible outside, weather permitting.
Spreading infection through sneezing etc	Children and adults are advised to cover their mouth and nose with a disposable tissue when they cough or sneeze and put the tissue in the bin. If no bin is available they should put the tissue into their pocket or up their sleeve for disposing of later. If you don't have any tissues available, they should cough and sneeze into the crook of their elbow. Children reminded to wash their hands after sneezing.
	Face coverings are not recommended to be worn for children under the age of 12.

Child or staff member is unwell with symptoms of COVID-19	If anyone becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough, a high temperature, or loss of taste/smell they must be sent home and advised to follow the COVID-19 guidance for households with possible coronavirus infection guidance.
	If a child is awaiting collection, they should be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age of the child and with appropriate adult

		supervision if required. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom should be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else. PPE should be worn by staff caring for the child while they await collection if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs). In an emergency, we will call 999 if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. If a member of staff has helped someone who was unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, they do not need to go home unless they develop symptoms themselves (and in which case, a test is available) or the child subsequently tests positive. They should wash their
		hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after any contact with someone who is unwell. Cleaning the affected area with normal household disinfectant after someone with symptoms has left will reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people.
